

More than 600 photographs have been entered into the largest regional competition in NSW, the 2023 Northern NSW Zone Interclub competition. Entries have been provided by nine camera clubs from Taree, Forster, Grafton, Coffs Harbour, Lismore, Nambucca Heads, Port Macquarie, Tamworth and Kempsey.

This is the 47th annual interclub competition organised by the Northern NSW Zone of Photographic Societies, and the first post-COVID convention. Entries will be judged by the FCC, and results will be announced at the exhibition and convention that takes place on 19-21 May.

Spotlight on...

Jacque-Henri Lartique

Jacque-Henri Lartigue has been called "the ultimate amateur". Born to a wealthy family in Paris in 1894, he was given his first camera when he was eight. He never thought of himself as a photographer: he merely photographed his own life for pleasure. He kept his photographs in family albums. His subject matter was primarily society life of the prosperous and privileged people in his social circle. Throughout his life he used a Kodak Brownie camera to take snapshots of sport events (such as the French Grand Prix); early flights of aviation pioneers; tennis players at the French Open tennis championships; his three wives and his Romanian mistress, the model Renée Perle. He is most famous for his stunning photos of turn-of-thecentury France as portrayed through the eyes of a boy from the age of 8 to 18.

Much to his surprise, at 69 years old, Lartigue became one of the twentieth century's most famous photographers. After a life of being unknown, his photos were shown in a solo exhibition at the Museum of Modern Art in New York. Following this breakthrough, he then was invited to work with fashion magazines and became famous in other countries as well. His first book, Diary of a Century was published in 1970 in collaboration with the American fashion and portrait photographer, Richard Avedon. In 1974, he was commissioned by the newly elected President of France, Valéry Giscard d'Estaing, to shoot his official portrait. He continued taking photographs, painting and writing until his death in 1986, at the age of 92. He left behind more than 100,000 photographs, 7,000 diary pages and 1,500 paintings. He has been called the "photographer of happiness", an amateur who took images for love rather than money.

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
