AGM 2024



At our AGM, FCC President Michelle Kennedy, thanked Clubs for supporting the FCC over the past two years and outlined new plans for 2024-26.

More than 60 people attended the FCC's AGM in person or via Zoom in June 2024.

Achievements over the past two years included making it cheaper for smaller Clubs to enter InterClub competitions, publishing F-Stop every two months, revitalising the FCC Judges course and increasing the number of judges in the state from 59 to 80, and putting the FCC's accounts on a more business-like basis.

"However, we have much more to do. TopShot and the InterClub competitions are becoming a little stale and more can be done to make these into the best photography awards in the State. The FCC also needs to develop more learning resources for Clubs" said Michelle. Information on these new developments will be provided to Clubs in coming months.

Many Club delegates asked the FCC Committee about Club insurance. Currently the FCC provides Public Liability Insurance (in case a member of the public is injured). Many clubs also want a new type of insurance to protect club members if they are injured on a Club outing. The FCC has been discussing the need for this new insurance with its insurance broker.

Michelle thanked outgoing Committee members who had served during the 2022-24 period: Albert Hakvoort, Alison Wong, Chris Kenyon, Nancy Morley and Russell Field.

The new FCC Committee for 2024-26 is made up of: Michelle Kennedy (President); Cathie Stubbs (Treasurer); Don Munro (Secretary); Andie Scibilia (F-Stop Editor), and Committee Members Allan Rose, Mark Ward, Peita Ward, Ray Williams and Robin Moon.

The Committee still has a vacancy for another Committee Member, and would like to fill that position with a member based in regional NSW, if possible.

Michelle also noted that this year the FCC turns 70, making it one of the oldest institutions in Australia supporting photographers and photography. "I am very proud the FCC is a strong seventy-year-old organisation – one that is in a good position to keep working for its members in the future,"





On 11 May Peter MacFarlane, President, Club Taree Photographic announced the winners of the Interclub and Individual competitions organised by the Northern NSW Zone of Photographic Societies. The 9 Clubs in the Northern Zone entered almost 600 images, of which 450 were in the InterClub competition and 150 where in the individual competition.

The Northern Photographic Federation's is holding its annual showcase of photography in the Hunter Valley on the 27th and 28th of July 2024.



Dooleys wins the Ashes Trophy



Forget cricket! This year Dooleys Camera Club beat Ryde Eastwood and Port Hacking camera clubs to win the coveted 2024 Ashes Trophy.

The Ashes Trophy is an annual competition between the three Clubs. This year the competition night was hosted by the Ryde Eastwood Leagues Camera Club and attended by around 30 people. The competition is hosted on a rotating basis.

Bob Stephenson, Secretary, Ryde-Eastwood reports that the Ashes commenced as a yearly competition when Bob Milojevic started the Dooley's Camera Club at the Lidcombe Catholic Club in 2005. Bob devised a competition between Dooley's and Ryde Eastwood camera clubs. It was a beginner's competition and only 'B' grade members could enter.

In 2010 when the standard of photography at Dooleys strengthened, the Ashes became an Open competition and all members were eligible to submit images. The Ashes trophy was originally a sealed trophy with a burnt print inside, but this trophy has now been replaced.

The Ashes became a three-way competition when Port Hacking joined in 2013. At that time, there was a separate three-way competition between Port Hacking, Dooley's and Lane Cove. When Lane Cove withdrew, Ryde Eastwood amalgamated the two competitions to establish today's three-way competition.

In recent years, all clubs have shared the wins, with Port Hacking winning in 2016; Ryde Eastwood in 2017 and 2023; and Dooley's winning in 2018, 2019 and 2024. It has been a great social competition between the three Clubs for all these years.

Last call for FCC Indges Course

Nowra, 27 & 28 July

Only a few places remain for the next FCC Photographic Judges course being held at Nowra on Saturday 27 and Sunday 28 July.

Although the course is open to all photographers, it is especially designed for Club members interested in judging photos. It is also attended by current FCC judges who wish to update their skills.

The course covers how to analyse, give positive feedback on, and score photographs. It is a practical course with presentations, discussions and numerous practice sessions.

People interested in becoming official FCC Judges will need to (i) successfully complete the 2-day course, (ii) have at least 12 months experience participating in a camera club or as a professional photographer, and (iii) carry out several judging sessions with the support of a mentor judge.

The two-day course costs \$75 per person which covers the cost of morning and afternoon teas and lunch organised by the Shoalhaven Photography Club, the FCC Judges' Handbook.

Successful Judges Course at Coffs Harbour

Twenty people from seven Clubs in northern NSW attended the FCC's Judges Course hosted by the Coffs Harbour on 18 and 19 May. Clubs represented at the course came from Coffs Harbour, Lismore, Taree, Ballina, Lismore, Grafton and Nambucca.

Donna Baldwin, President, Cex Coffs Camera Club welcomed attendees to the Course, and Michelle Kennedy, President, FCC spoke on the important role skilled judges have in supporting Club members. Michelle also thanked the Cex. Coffs Camera Club which organised the venue for the course.

Sharron Sykes and Annette Brauer from the Coffs Camera Club and Don Munro from the FCC gave talks on judging a photo's content, composition and technical aspects. Allan Rose from the FCC gave a special talk on how to judge Nature photography.

The course, which covers ways to analyse, give positive feedback on, and score images, has been successfully run in Sydney and Newcastle. An innovation at the Coffs course was a discussion on how to judge different styles of photography a judge will come across (such as Pictorialism, surrealism and abstract photography).

People who successfully complete the Course are required to carry out several judgings with the assistance of a Mentor before they are added to the FCC Judges List. Assuming all applicants are successful, the Northern Zone is expected to have 14 new judges available in the coming months.

Get Shot

Camera Clubs looking for an outing are welcome to visit the State Library of NSW to see the work of 200 professional, commercial, studio, press and amateur photographers, including the work by some of Australia's most acclaimed photographers.

Shot: 400 photographs, 200 photographers, 3 centuries is the first exhibition to comprehensively review the Library's photo collections — one of the largest, most diverse, and significant in Australia.

Chris Kenyon, FCC Committee Member and President of the Pennant Hills Photographic Club says this is a "unique exhibition that shows how Australian photography has changed over the last two centuries" and that it is "highly recommended" for interested Clubs. It includes examples of nearly every format used since the inception of photography in 1839, from the earliest surviving photograph in Australia, a daguerreotype taken in 1845, through to ambrotypes, calotypes, autotypes, glass-plate negatives, Paget plates, albumen prints, autochromes and digital photographs.

Individuals and Clubs can join a regular short tour with the Curator -<u>https://www.sl.nsw.gov.au/events/discover-our-new-photography-exhibition-shot-2</u> but Clubs such as Pennant Hills Photographic Club and Mosman Camera Club have organised private tours for their Clubs which can run for an-hour-and-a-half. For Clubs that can't get to Sydney, the Library has a digital collection which can accessed anywhere.

Club Insurance

Thirty-four representatives of member clubs attended a Zoom meeting on 20 June 2024 to clarify who was covered under FCC-brokered insurance and who wasn't.

Many clubs have public liability insurance, provided by the FCC, which protects clubs from personal accident or related claims made by members of the public.

However, following requests by member clubs, the FCC now also plans to provide Participant Insurance, a new form of insurance to protect Clubs from claims made by club members if they were injured or disabled on a Club outing, meeting or event. The cost to Clubs of Participant Insurance is expected to be less than the cost of Public Liability Insurance.

The need for participant insurance was a surprise to many club office bearers who thought personal injury claims by club members would be covered by public liability insurance – which they aren't.

The meeting also discussed Volunteer Insurance, which the FCC provides to all member Club Committees. Volunteer Insurance covers Club Committee members who may suffer a personal injury whilst carrying out their Club responsibilities. The FCC Treasurer asked all Clubs to urgently provide her with their club membership numbers, and whether they were interested "in principle" in taking out Participant Insurance.

The FCC also undertook to clarify with its insurance broker questions such as whether regional interclub events (such as the Northern NSW Zone or the Western Districts organisations) would be covered by Participant Insurance.

Club representatives provided many practical suggestions on how to prevent their members from being injured, which the FCC will collate and provide to all clubs for their use.



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
